Students who continue Religious Studies into Key Stage 4 follow the AQA GCSE Religious Studies (Specification A) course. They will study two religions—Islam and Christianity—in depth, examining key beliefs, practices, and sources of authority. Building on this foundation, students explore a range of contemporary themes, including relationships and family life, the origins and value of life, crime and punishment, and issues of peace and conflict. These topics continue into Year 11, encouraging students to consider how religious beliefs shape attitudes and everyday decisions. Throughout the course, students develop critical skills of explanation, analysis, and evaluation, learning to discuss different religious perspectives and the impact of faith in modern society. Assessment is through two final examination papers at the end of Year 11. To prepare, students complete regular practice exam questions, end-of-unit tests, and mid- and end-of-year assessments. In Year 11, they also sit two full mock exams, giving valuable experience before the final GCSE assessments.
